2025 — A YEAR OF GROWTH

In 2025, the FIP Foundation Board's work was guided by our 2025–2029 Strategic Plan, which focuses on four priority areas: research; connections and collaborations; leadership development; and, development/fundraising. In this report, we are proud to share our successes and significant advances in these priorities.

During the year, we strengthened our partnership with the FIP Early Career Pharmaceutical Group (ECPG), maintained collaboration with our three existing partners, and launched two new partnerships with the United States Pharmacopoeia (USP) and the Academic Pharmacy Section (AcPS).

These partnerships contributed to the support and delivery of the following research and leadership initiatives:

- The Hospital Pharmacy Section (*HPS*) for two research grants;
- The Community Pharmacy Section (*CPS*) to support a leadership scholar;

- The Academic Pharmacy Section (*AcPS*) to support two annual research grants;
- The United States Pharmacopoeia (*USP*) to initiate and support one annual research grant.

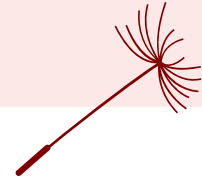

RESEARCH

The FIP Foundation accelerates research activities through grants, research incubation, and the development of collaborative research partnerships that address global pharmacy challenges.

FIP FOUNDATION AND ECPG INNOVATION RESEARCH GRANT

This partnership provides a EUR 1,000 grant to support innovation in pharmacy by an early-career pharmacist or pharmaceutical scientist. Awarded annually since 2002, the grant helps recipients implement their projects and covers travel expenses to attend the FIP world congress to present their findings.

2025 GRANT RECIPIENTS

Dr Praveen Devanandan from India was awarded this grant for the project “PharmaLearn-TB: A Pharmacist-Led Microlearning Health Literacy Program to Improve Adherence and Outcomes in Tuberculosis Care”. Dr Praveen is the Head of the Department of Pharmacy Practice at St. Peter’s Institute of Pharmaceutical Sciences, India. He has served on various international committees and has received numerous honours, including the FIP Ton Hoek Scholarship for Young Leaders (2024) and the FIP Early Career Leadership Development Scholarship (2023). Dr Praveen actively contributes to global pharmacy through leadership roles in FIP- SEARPharm Forum, ISPOR India–Telangana Chapter, and IPA Hanamkonda Chapter. His research spans tuberculosis, diabetes, COVID-19, and health literacy, with a strong focus on patient care and clinical pharmacy education.

FIP FOUNDATION AND HPS RESEARCH GRANT

This partnership, launched in 2023, funds research aimed at advancing hospital pharmacy practice and patient care. Two awards, each up to EUR 3,000, were granted in 2025.

2025 GRANT RECIPIENTS

Mr Kingston Wai Chiu Mak Yeung from Australia, a PhD candidate at the University of Sydney, is researching ways to improve transitions of care and medication safety. The HPS Research Grant will help support the “Evaluation of a Pharmacy Technician-Enhanced Transition of Care (PETOC) model to facilitate post-discharge Home Medicines Reviews for high-risk patients”.

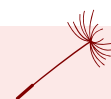

Ms Katelyn Jauregui from Australia, is a PhD candidate at the University of Sydney and a clinical pharmacist at Campbelltown Hospital. The HPS Research Grant will support her research exploring clinicians’ rationales for prescribing extended-release rather than immediate-release opioids for acute post-operative pain.

FIP FOUNDATION AND BOARD OF PHARMACY SPECIALITIES GRANT

This partnership was established in 2023 to promote research in the field of pharmacist certification and its impact on specialisation and advanced practice. In 2025, one research grant of up to EUR 5,000 was awarded.

2025 GRANT RECIPIENT

Dr Abdikarim Mohamed Abdi is an Associate Professor of Clinical Pharmacy at Yeditepe University in Istanbul, Türkiye. A Fellow of FIP and a member of the ESCP Research Committee, he currently serves as an elected Executive Committee member and Treasurer of the FIP Academic Section. Dr Abdi has been instrumental in clinical pharmacy and pharmaceutical care education in both North Cyprus and Türkiye, notably playing a leading role in establishing hospital-based pharmaceutical care centres that bridge academia and practice. His research focuses on rational drug use in hospitals, the implementation and evaluation of clinical pharmacy services, and pharmacy education.

FIP FOUNDATION AND ACADEMIC PHARMACY SECTION GRANT

This new partnership was established in 2025 to support innovative research by pharmacy educators. Two awards, each up to EUR 2,000, were granted in 2025.

2025 GRANT RECIPIENTS

Dr Basira Kankia Lawal from Nigeria, is a Senior Lecturer at the Faculty of Pharmaceutical Sciences, Kaduna State University, Nigeria. She will be conducting research on “Gamification of Antimicrobial Stewardship Education: Empowering Undergraduate Pharmacy Students as Leaders in Tackling Antimicrobial Resistance”.

FIP FOUNDATION AND UNITED STATES PHARMACOPOEIA (USP) GRANT

This new partnership, launched in 2025, supports a non-US-based investigator to assess the impact of pharmaceutical pictograms on the comprehension of medication information. One award of up to EUR 5,000 was granted in January 2026.

2025 GRANT RECIPIENT

Ms Cynthia Akumanue is a clinical pharmacist and lecturer at the University for Development Studies in Ghana. She holds a Doctor of Pharmacy (PharmD) and a master's degree in Clinical Pharmacy, and is currently pursuing a PhD in Clinical Pharmacy. Her academic and professional work focuses on pharmacy practice, infectious diseases, noncommunicable disease management, and simulation-based education. She has a strong interest in enhancing the quality of pharmaceutical care through optimised medication-use processes, patient counselling, clinical skills training, and health systems strengthening in low-resource and resource-constrained healthcare settings.

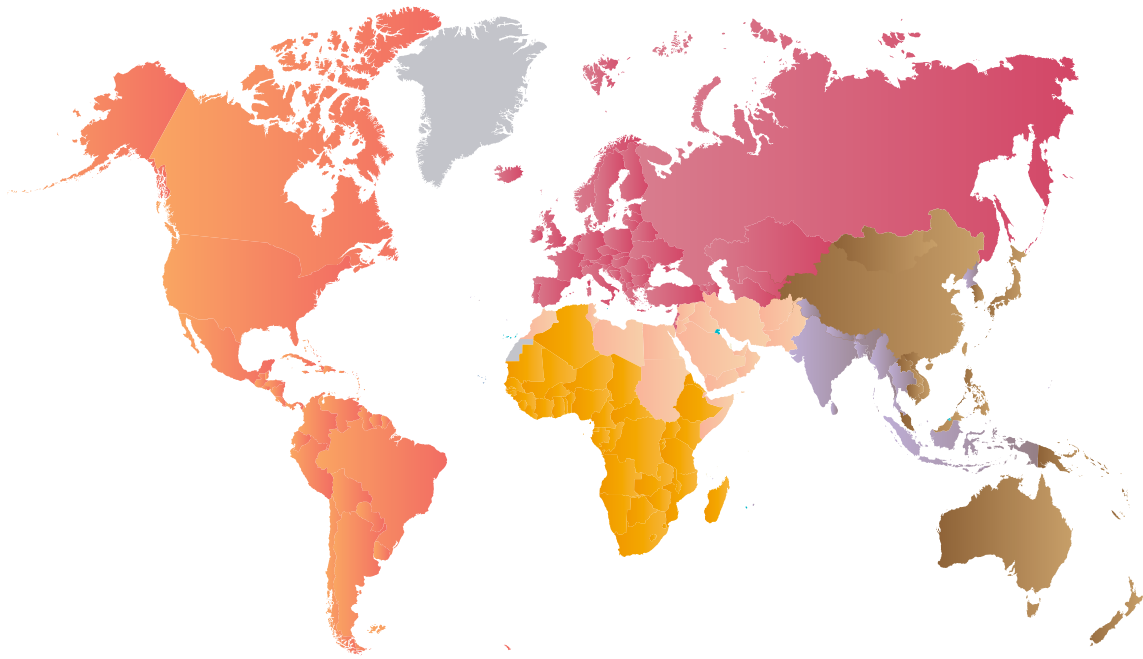

The Ton Hoek Scholarship

The FIP Foundation bestows an annual scholarship to one of the six Early Career Leadership Development Scholars selected in the previous year, enabling them to repeat travel to an FIP congress to further develop their leadership skills and advance their engagement with global pharmacy. The award is named after the late Ton Hoek (1955– 2012), a former FIP chief executive officer.

The 2025 scholarship recipient, Md. Mirajul Islam, received the scholarship award and was recognised at the 2025 FIP world congress. He is a registered pharmacist in Bangladesh and a Senior Programme Manager and Lead Instructor at the Vennue Foundation. He has trained health staff and pharmacy students across 20 facilities, improving pharmaceutical knowledge and patient care.

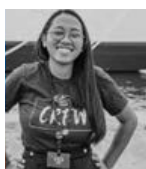
Leadership and transition

Activities in 2025

- Global visibility increased significantly through the first official Pharmabridge LinkedIn page (427 followers by December 2025)
- One on-site exchange initiated in 2024 continued throughout 2025.
- Registered candidates were connected with an FIP programme or specialist for virtual support.
- Pharmabridge registration forms and website were redesigned and updated.
- Three Pharmabridge newsletters were distributed.
- The first bilingual Pharmabridge webinar (English and Spanish) was held in collaboration with the FIP Community Pharmacy Section (FIP-CPS).
- During the FIP world congress 2025, a special event highlighted Pharmabridge education and mentorship opportunities. It also highlighted Nepalese experiences with Pharmabridge, showcasing the development of long-standing collaborations and future plans for the programme.

Pharmabridge liaisons and host collaborations

Treasurer report

The annual account of the FIP Foundation for Education and Research, as of 31 December 2025, was subjected to a compilation engagement by a firm of accountants in April 2026. The compilation engagement was conducted in accordance with the applicable Dutch law and code of ethics.

In the calendar year to December 2025, the Foundation received a total of *EUR 51,444.00* in donations. Of this, *EUR 29,000.00* was restricted, in that it was designated for a specific programme or purpose. The balance of *EUR 22,444.00* was in the form of unrestricted donations. This included an amount of *EUR 883.50* in royalties on the sale of Dr Renly Lim's book "Maya's Pharmacy Adventure" (available at [Amazon](#)). Unrestricted donations are also made by registrants to the FIP congress, participants in the FIP Fun Run, and those who purchased materials at the FIP congress.

In 2025, the Foundation, with support from partners, was able to provide grants totalling *EUR 28,953.00*. These included the Early Career Leadership Development (ECLD) scholarships, Community Pharmacy Section ECLD scholarship, the Ton Hoek Travel scholarship, the Hospital Pharmacy Section research grants, the Academic Pharmacy section research grants, the Early Career Pharmacist Group Innovation Research grant, the Board of Pharmacy Specialities Research Grant and Pharmabridge. Apart from the Early Career Leadership Development scholarships, these are all covered by specified donations on

an annual basis. The Ton Hoek Scholarship draws from accumulated funds dedicated to that purpose. As indicated in 2024, the Foundation is now applying an administrative overhead charge to cover the costs borne by the Foundation in advertising, adjudicating, and administering research and other grants, disbursing funds, and providing other support to recipients. In 2026, a new restricted research grant from the US Pharmacopoeia will commence.

In 2025, the Foundation incurred operating costs in the amount of *EUR 22,624.00*, of which the largest components were for staff support, auditing and website costs.

Overall, the Foundation's retained assets totalled *EUR 197,617.00* at the end of the financial year, compared with *EUR 199,986.00* at the end of 2024. Of the retained assets, an amount of *EUR 112,360.00* is held in an interest-bearing longer-term investment account. In 2025, the Foundation earned *EUR 2,315.00* in interest.

Intensified effort is therefore needed to attract additional donations to the Foundation from individuals, organisations, philanthropies, and potential partners in advancing the core objectives of the Foundation, which are to support the education of and research by pharmacists, pharmaceutical scientists, and pharmacy educators. In order to limit drawings on accumulated reserves, the Foundation has set a target of *EUR 29,300.00* in restricted donations and *EUR 35,500.00* in unrestricted donations in 2026. This will require the mobilisation of an additional *EUR 20,000.00* compared to 2025.
